

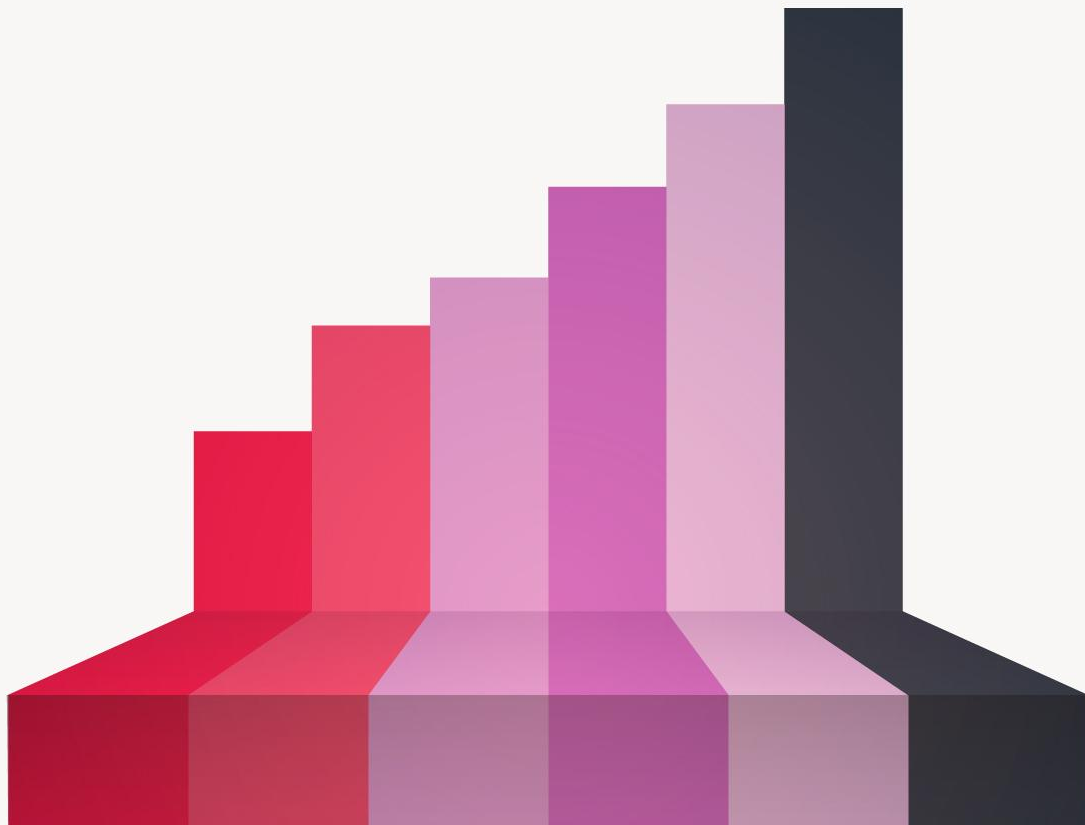

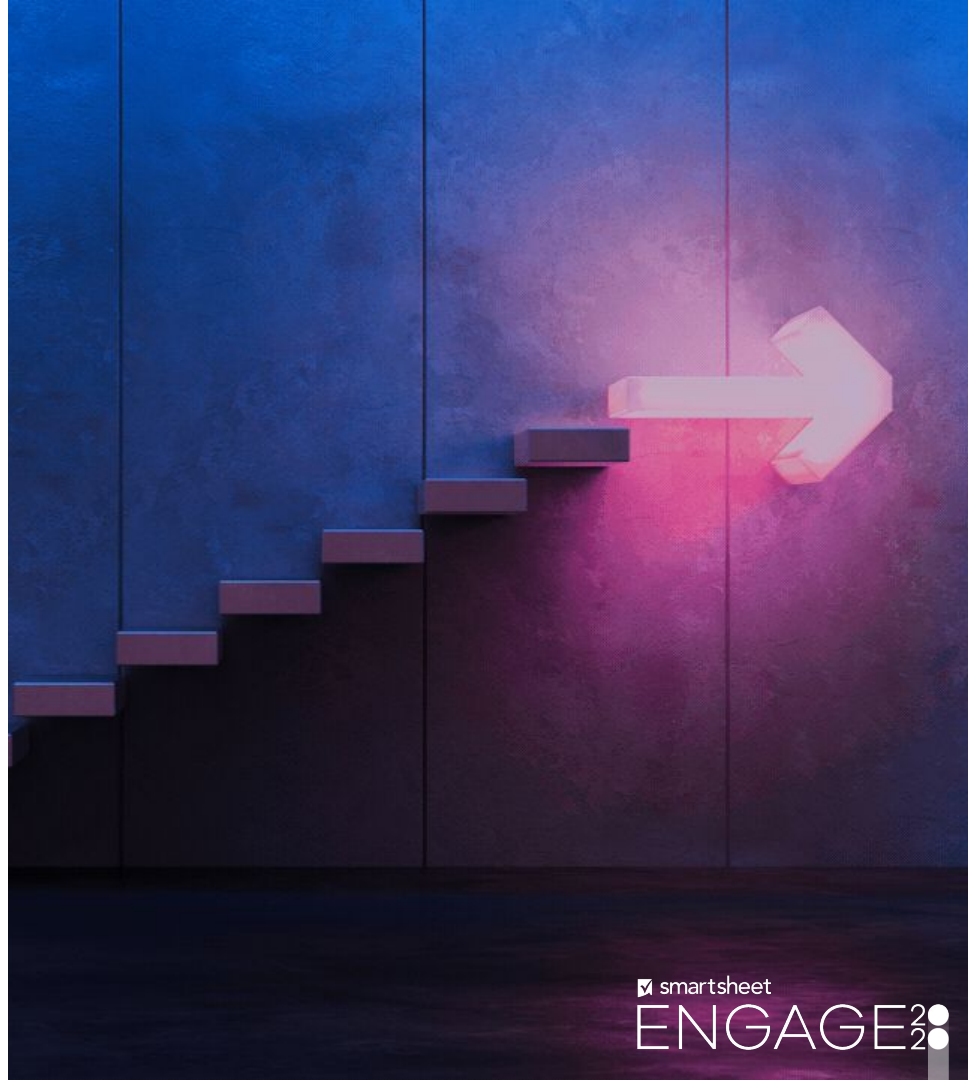

Vib	Sydney	=VLOOKUP(Employee4, Employee8:Manager11, 3, false)

In closing

1. VLOOKUP is great for quickly putting together a reference formula.
2. The Index/Match function is a hardier combination better suited for a long term solution
